He demanded to be crucified in the reverse position, with his head down. Ironically, this wish was granted by the taunting Romans in Nero's circus AD 67."Jowett
2 And	drew	Brother of Peter	Mk 1:29; Mat 4:18; John 1:40	According to Eusebius, spent time in Scythia in Southern Russia in the area around the Black Sea and for a long time was known as the patron saint of Russia. He has also been placed in Asia Minor with John and in Greece.	Andrew is said to have been crucified in Patras, in Southern Greece in the year AD 69 (on the last day of November?). The cross used was in the form of an "X". To this day, that form of cross is known as "The St. Andrew's Cross". Relics of Andrew were taken to Scotland in the 4 th century to an area later known as St. Andrews. Today he is the patron saint of Scotland and the St. Andrews Cross is a part of the nation's flag.

4 Joh	hn	Son of Zebedee	Matt 4:21; Mk 1:19; Luke 5:10	Lived much of the time at Ephesus where he cared for Mary, Jesus' mother, until her death. He was imprisoned for a time on the penal island of Patmos, off the coast of Turkey, where he wrote the book of Revelation.	John died peacefully in Ephesus at an advanced age around the year 100 AD.
5 Phi	ilip		John 1:43	After the ascension of Christ, Philip was said to have traveled into Scythia where he preached the Gospel for twenty years; he then preached at Hierapolis in Phrygia. Philip had four daughters who uttered prophecies. Philip was also reported to have visited France.	It was reliably reported that Philip died at Hierapolis. According to one writer, he was crucified and stoned while on the cross by a group of priests of dragon worshipers. The apocryphal <i>Acts of Philip</i> said that he was "martyred by being pierced through the thighs and hung upside down".
6 Bar	rtholomew	believed by some to be the same as Nathaniel who was brought to Christ by Philip	Matt 10:3; Mk 3:18; Luke 6:14	was said to have preached the Gospel at Hierapolis with Philip and was present at the martyrdom of Philip. Bartholomew is also reported to have visited India and left a Hebrew copy of the Gospel of Matthew there. It is said that he and Thaddeus carried the Gospel to Armenia (Thaddeus from 35-43 AD and Bartholomew from 44-60 AD).	After having converted many in Armenia (Scythia) to the faith "he was flayed alive by the barbarians, and by command of King Astiages fulfilled his martyrdom by beheadingat a place called Albanopolis (Derbend on the West coast of the Caspian Sea.)" in 68 AD.
7 Tho	omas	Called Didymas or "the twin", also "doubting Thomas"	Matt 10:3; Mk 3:18; Luke 6:15; Acts 1:13	Reported to have "established a church in Babylon" (with Jude Thaddeus) and then arrived in India "no later than 49 AD", He was said to be in Malabar, South India in 52 AD where he established several churches.	Thomas was martyred in India. One account said that he "was thrust through by a spear" while on his knees in prayer.

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8	Matthew	Also Levi, the tax collector	Matt 9:9; Mk 2:14; Luke 5:27	Author of the Gospel of Matthew, written originally in Hebrew or Aramaic for "those of the circumcision who believed". Some report Matthew's visiting Ethiopia, but this was probably a similarly named area to the south of the Caspian Sea in Persia.	According to one account (Clement of Alexandria), Matthew "died a natural death". According to the <i>Talmud</i> , Matthew was condemned to death by the Jewish Sanhedrin.
9	James	"Son of Alphaeus" (and a brother of Matthew Levi?)	Matt 4:21; Mk 3:18; Luke 5:10	Often confused with James, the brother of Jesus, but one likely account indicates that he was the first bishop of the Syrian church.	May have been "stoned by the Jews for preaching Christ andburied by the Sanctuary in Jerusalem."
10	Jude Thaddaeus	son of "James the Elder", grandson of Zebedee	Matt 10:3	preached the gospel in Armenia from 35-43 AD (or 43-66)	was martyred ("killed with a halberd") at Ardaze in Armenia in 50 AD (possibly at the same time as Simon Zelotes).
11	Simon	The Canaanite, also Simon Zelotes	Matt 10:4; Mk 3:18; Luke 6:15	According to Dorotheus, bishop of Tyre in AD 300: "Simon Zelotes traversed all Mauritania and the regions of the Africans, preaching Christ." He is said to have arrived in Britain in 60 AD, brought there by Joseph of Arimathea.	again, according to Dortheus, Simon was "crucified, slain and buried in Britain" perhaps in the vicinity of Caistor, Lincolnshire, according to some traditions, on May 10, 61 AD. By another tradition, he spent time in Persia with Jude Thaddaeus and was martyred there ("sawn assunder") at the same time as Jude.
